The Immigrant Experience: Three Perspectives

Immigration to the United States is a complex demographic phenomenon that has been a major source of population growth and cultural change throughout much of the history of the United States. As such, it is often the subject of significant public and political debate, with questions about the size of inflows, the role of immigrants in the labor market, enforcement and humanitarian admission policies, and benefits and costs. In 2014 more than 42.4 million immigrants resided in the U.S. according to American Community Survey (ACS) data. This is 13.3 percent of the total U.S. population of 318.9 million.

This presentation we will offer a personal look at immigration that moves beyond statistics by highlighting the stories of three immigrants to the U.S. The goal of this presentation is to identify common threads of the immigrant experience as well as highlight the uniqueness of individual immigrant experiences.
