Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center – School Of Pharmacy Residency Program

The Graduate Pharmacy Education (Residency) Program at TTUHSC - SOP was established in 1997 and promotes excellence in patient care by providing education, development, and advanced training to practitioners, educators, and scholars. Residents support the SOP mission by expanding faculty practice and scholarship activities; as Assistant Instructors, residents are also actively integrated into the education of Pharm.D. students, serving as clerkship preceptors and small-group facilitators. The Residency Program, under the direction of Dr. Steve Pass, offers diverse training opportunities through 15 unique Pharmacy Practice and Specialty Resident programs located in Abilene, Amarillo, Dallas-Fort Worth and Lubbock. Presently, 25 residents are enrolled in this program. Since its formation, more than 200 residents have successfully completed residency training. Residents participate in a variety of learning opportunities as part of their program such as a longitudinal Clinician-Educator Teaching Certificate Program. Faculty members present monthly topics to residents related to teaching. This year the Teaching Certificate Program has been revised to provide more hands-on lecturing to the residents. Every resident interested in a teaching certificate will present an optional lecture to an audience of residents and pharmacists, who will then evaluate the residents' performance during the lecture and give constructive feedback on improvement areas. The program has been evolving each year to enhance learning opportunities and encourage residents to pursue academic positions upon completion of the program.

Interview with Brittany M. Johansen, PharmD, BCPS

1. Q: Where did you complete your residency training?

A: VA North Texas Health Care System

2. Q: What were the top 3 factors you considered when deciding to pursue residency training?

A: I felt like I wanted more experience before 'getting out in the real world.' I wanted to have a career with a clinical focus, as I very much enjoyed my clinical rotations and it's unlikely to secure a clinical position without first having done a residency. I knew taking time off to start a family would be more flexible with a clinical position vs. retail. What made me pick a particular program—location, program set-up, and SOP affiliation.

3. Q: What was the most rewarding/unique experience you had as a resident?

A: Bonding with co-residents.

4. Q: What advice would you give to a current pharmacy student who is unsure if they should pursue residency training?

A: More training and experience is always a good idea. It's easier to continue in the 'student/learning' mind-set than go out into the workforce and come back. If you do change your mind, it's not impossible, though.

5. Q: How do you feel that residency training has impacted your career path thus far?

A: Significant impact! Residency training helped me with time management, team/colleague/patient rapport, improved my presentation content, style and confidence; most significantly, residency gave me an extra year with a 'safety net,' in the form of rotation preceptors to practice and gain confidence in my knowledge and skills.

Bio: Dr. Johansen is an Advanced Practice Geriatric Clinical Pharmacist with the Home Based Primary Care program at the Dallas VA Medical Center and also the Pharmacy PGY1 Residency Coordinator for VA North Texas Health Care System. A: I was one of those folks who was unsure if I wanted to do a residency until the last minute, and I'm so glad I did! I learned so much and had a blast during residency year. You get to practice as a licensed pharmacist yet have preceptors who will help guide you along the way.

5. Q: How do you feel that residency training has impacted your career path thus far?

A: It refined my clinical judgment skills and helped me become more confident in making pharmacotherapy recommendations.

Interview with Anjali Patel, Pharm.D., BCPS

1. Q: Where did you complete your residency training?

A: VA North Texas Healthcare System and Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center - PGY1 Pharmacy Practice Residency and PGY2 Ambulatory Care Residency.

2. Q: What were the top 3 factors you considered when deciding to pursue residency training?

A: Desire to complete additional clinical training at a teaching facility, patient care involvement, and diversity of experiences in difference fields (i.e. critical care, pediatrics, ambulatory care, ID, etc.)

3. Q: What was the most rewarding/unique experience you had as a resident?

A: I think the most rewarding experience during my residency was being able to present my research project (as a poster) at a major HIV conference. My title was "Safety and Efficacy of Rosuvastatin in HIV patients on NNRTI based HAART regimens." It was definitely a great accomplishment, and I am very proud of it.

4. Q: What advice would you give to a current pharmacy student who is unsure if they should pursue residency training?

A: My advice would be to pursue a residency if you are interested in clinical practice. Practice residencies give you an array of experiences that allow you to see where you fit in and most importantly it allows you to grow personally and professionally. Not only does a residency help you build on the knowledge and skills you learned in pharmacy school, but it also gives you the opportunity to develop leadership skills, time management skills, networking skills, and professionalism.

5. Q: How do you feel that residency training has impacted your career path thus far?

A: I feel that residency training better prepared me clinically and professionally to become the practitioner I am today. It allowed me to take advantage of difference opportunities in the pharmacy realm to help build my knowledge and skillset. I have always been interested in outpatient care, but I took advantage of the opportunities for inpatient training during residency so that I could be a well-rounded practitioner.

Bio: After completing my ambulatory care residency training in 2011, I got married and moved to Springfield, MO where I had the opportunity to work in an independent pharmacy and develop different programs for patient education and specialty drugs.
